## **RESEARCH**

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### **CURRENT RESEARCH**

I study the cultural geography of land use change and the politics of environmental decision making at the urban-rural interface. I focus on negotiations and conflicts related to differing ways of understanding environments and performing environmental stewardship. Most of my work relates to intersections between urbanization, environmental policy, and activism around agriculture and working landscapes – particularly landscapes that are simultaneously valued for natural resource production, sustainability, and moral economy.

My research is ethnographic, historical, and policy-oriented, and focused on the relationships between land use and landscape ideologies as they can be understood through everyday material and representational practices. I am interested in the integration of qualitative and quantitative methods and in comparative methods for field study. I rely on publicly-engaged

participatory research processes to explore the implications of policy, activism, migration, and decision-making processes related to landscape practices.

My interests include the concepts of place, landscape, nature, sustainability, environmental change, and the practices of everyday life, as well as epistemological issues involved in the interplay between political ecology and other disciplinary studies of nature-society relations.

1. Green infrastructure and human settlement: land use change due to urbanization and urban dispersion; land use planning and negotiation around greenspace, recreation, and urban ecology.
2. Conspicuous production: urban, peri-urban, and small-scale rural agriculture and forestry; modern subsistence and community farming; sustainable consumption and production; everyday political economy; food system reform.
3. Modern pastoral: social practices that construct and produce 'working' landscapes; contradictions in the governance of food systems raised by differing approaches to modernity, development, and political economy; personal strategies for engaging economic restructuring.
